As we travel to events, we always find folks that need reassurance that God has a place for them in heaven no matter how unworthy they may think they are. Over and over, we hear that no one has really explained the salvation message as simply as we do in FCFI. It's hard for people to accept the fact that we "must change and become like little children in order to enter the kingdom of heaven," Matt. 18:3 (NIV). If I may, I'd like to share experiences from two funerals I recently attended. My college friend, Larry Rose, went home to be with the Lord on January 14th. After college I became a farmer, Larry climbed the corporate ladder working his entire life for General Foods. We visited him at his various stops across America. We stayed friends and I had the privilege of visiting him and his family a week before he passed. I'm reminded of the scripture in Matt. 19: 23-24 "It's hard for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of heaven. It's easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle." I was pleased that God was indeed gloried at Larry's Celebration of Life. The speakers, music and the pastor made it very clear that there is only one way to heaven. Even in dying Larry was instrumental in presenting Christ where the fields are white for the harvest.



The other experience was at my Uncle John's funeral on March 9th. My uncle lost his mom at a very young age and struggled for many years, but he finished well. He too, through his later years and

funeral service was still reaching out to others "where the fields are white for the harvest." My prayer for you and myself is that we never give up sharing Christ to a needy world.

Jesus lived in a society where most people were quite familiar with an agricultural lifestyle. Many would have had their own personal experiences with the labor associated with the cultivation of land both in seed time and harvest. They would have made their own living that way and thus it is not surprising that Jesus used that familiar theme in a number of His parables.

In the parable of the sower (Matthew 13: 1-9, 18-23) Jesus describes four different types of soil that seed can fall on. The sower is Jesus and the seed is the Word of God, His message of hope to the world. Sadly, only one of the four soils was good soil in which the seed could sprout and grow to produce a crop. We acknowledge that each time an FCFI volunteer shares the story of the beads with individuals we are simply sowing the seed that also will fall on a variety of soils. The hearers are not all receptive in the same way. Thankfully we are only asked to plant the seed. In 1 Corinthians 3: 6-8 Paul the apostle states "I planted the seed in your hearts and Apollos watered it, but it was God who made it grow. It's not important who does the planting, or who does the watering. What's important is that God makes the seed grow. The one who plants and the one who waters works together with the same purpose. And both will be rewarded for their own hard work."

In John 4:35-37 just after Jesus had an encounter with a Samaritan woman at the well he suddenly changes the focus of his conversation with his disciples to the urgency of an upcoming harvest...a spiritual harvest. "You know the saying, 'Four months between planting and harvest.' But I say, wake up and look around. The fields are already ripe for harvest. The harvesters are paid good wages, and the fruit they harvest is people brought to eternal life. What joy awaits both the planter and the harvester alike! You know the saying, 'One plants and another harvests.' And it's true."

In this dialogue Jesus is teaching his disciples the importance of evangelism and the resulting spiritual harvest. We have unlimited

opportunities to share the Gospel with individuals if we are willing and we should also have a sense of urgency that the time is short and the eternal destinies of people's lives are at stake. I was recently touched by the video series called The Engagement Project by Dr. Del Tackett. In the segment on reaching our neighbors he gave some convicting statistics. (The actual numbers might not be totally up to date but still make a challenging point.) He stated that the total population of the United States was 240 million and that 80 million were born again believers. That means that each individual believer would need to reach out to only 3 people in order to reach every American. Let us all be diligent in sharing the Gospel to those around us.

This scripture portion reminds us again that the work of evangelism is a collective effort where some sow the seeds while others may have the privilege of reaping the fruits of those seeds and each one will receive their rewards in eternity. 2.



"The Field Across the Road"

"Look, I tell you, lift up your eyes, and see that the fields are white for harvest." John 4: 35 Jesus' words convey certain urgency. Look. See. Lift up your eyes.

As I picture a field of souls ready to meet Jesus, I also see the field of grain Jesus spoke of, and I know neither field will harvest itself and neither will it show up at the farmer's front door, wave, and announce, "Here I am, ready to be harvested."

The wheat farmer must go to the field. Along the way, he may encounter difficulties—problems with farm machinery, health or family issues, severe weather—stumbling blocks to the harvest.

Wheat harvest is a perfect picture of the work of The Fellowship of Christian Farmers and our calling to labor in the soul fields. Compare:

- A grain of wheat consists of three parts, bran, germ, and endosperm. Humans consist of three parts, body, soul, and spirit.
- A timely harvest is crucial.
- Harvesting is a difficult process that requires good preparation.
- We can count on stumbling blocks that urge us to turn back.

Not long ago we faced exactly this when a young family moved in across the road. The first stumbling block came when Pete and I crossed the road to welcome them to the community. To our disappointment, we were snubbed. What did we have in common with these folks? They're young, we're old.



They dress in clothes we consider inappropriate, and we wear "old people" clothes. This can't be our field, we reasoned, and so we extended no further effort, other than to smile and wave as we passed by when walking our dog.

Then, a few weeks ago, we received news that the apartment we applied for almost four years ago was ours. We were excited, but with each box I packed, I couldn't shake the feeling that we had unfinished business with the family across the road. Had we missed the harvest?

The truth is we don't yet know. We pray we have not, and we're working to make up for lost time. Thankfully, we see God working in their lives. He's working in ours as well, reminding us to lift up our eyes, and see that the fields before us are white for harvest.

What a joy and privilege to be living in this great time of harvest. I encourage everyone reading this to get involved in the fun and begin to share Christ wherever you go because the harvest is truly ripe.

The Board of Directors for The Fellowship of Christian Farmers is excited to introduce Dan Janzen from Kalamazoo, Michigan as our new Executive Director. We asked you to pray as FCFI looked for a new Executive Director and God answered your prayers! Dan grew up on a family farm with a hard work ethic and amidst a diverse variety of crops in the Willamette Valley, Oregon. A region steeped in history as the destination of the Oregon Trail. His parents instilled a deep sense of faith and service which extended from many generations of Mennonite/Methodist and farming heritage. They ran the Fellowship of Christian Farmers booth for 23 years.

During his formative years, his home hosted missionaries, fostering a personal connection with those his parents and their church supported. Among them was Gene Lewton, a missionary with a farming background whose wise counsel forever altered his life's course. With just a few strategic sentences, Gene planted the seed of possibility within him: the idea of becoming an agricultural missionary. From that moment, Dan was steadfast in pursuing this calling.



Years later, Dan had the privilege of joining Gene in Kenya for a three-month agricultural internship. Gene, having dedicated over four decades to mission work, was a beacon of dedication and service.

One of the most cherished memories from his eight years as a missionary in South Sudan was a conversation with the wife of a young man, Kalo, from the Nuba Mountains. Visiting to provide agricultural training, he remarked on her husband's remarkable grasp of the Christian worldview and his application of biblical principles to uplift his community. She attributed his transformation to a book, 'Poverty of Nations: A Sustainable Solution,' which Dan had provided him with. It was a poignant reminder of the profound impact a simple gesture, like sharing a book, can have on someone's life journey.





- The Dark Bead represents sin. Sin separates us from God. Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God."
- The Red Color represents the blood of Christ. Romans 5:8 "But God commends his love for us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died or Us." When we accept Christ as our Savior our sins are washed White as snow. Isaiah 1:18 We're forgiven. Romans 10:9 "Confess with our mouth and

believe in your heart that God raised Christ from the dead, and you shall be saved."
